Speakers

Ely Almeida is a trainer of political education focusing on the critic of racism. At LAG politische kulturelle Bildung Sachsen e. V. (pokuBi) she offers besides empowerment structures counselling and workshops for people with experiences of racism.

Dr. Heidi Grunebaum is author, film maker and senior researcher at the Centre for Humanities Research (CHR) of the University of Western Cape. Her work focuses on social and esthetical dimensions of genocide, war and violence.

Heike Kleffner is journalist and director of the Association of Counseling Centers for Victims of Rightwing, Racist and Anti-Semitic Violence in Germany (VBRG e.V.).

Marcel Kolvenbach, internationally renowned journalist and film maker is travelling since 25 years with the camera in Europe, Latin America and Africa. Main focus: Human rights, environment and development. Presently he is editor at the TV station SWR.

Prof. Dr. Tshepo Madlingozi is director of the Center for Applied Legal Studies (CALS) at the University of Witwatersrand in Johannesburg. As a critical thinker a.o. to post colonial theories and activist he is working with organisations of victims of Apartheid for human rights and social justice.

Dr. Rirhandu Mageza Barthel is political scientist at the University of Frankfurt/ Main with a focus on Gender politics in the Global South. She is guest professor for Gender Politics at the University of Kassel.

Mbalenhie Matandela is Black feminist activist and researcher at the Centre for the Study of Violence and Reconciliation (CSVR). Her participation in the #MustFall-Movements has inspired many of her articles for the Mail and Guardian, Cape Times and Daily Maverick.

Georg Meyer is a South African priest. He studied theology in South Africa and Brasil and works as a liaison officer Africa and director of the German East Asia Mission (DOAM) at the Evangelischen Mission in Solidarität (EMS) - Protestant Mission in Solidarity.

Lebohang Liepollo Pheko is economist, Black feminist and senior research fellow at the Trade Collective Think Tank. She is known as an economic and political analyst (a.o. for AlJazeera, BBC, Sky, CCTV, SABC, ENCA, SAFM) and as a columnist and essayist on socio economic questions.

Thinking Africa new

Complicated relations – Africa and Europa 25 years after the end of political Apartheid

In South Africa, many postcolonial struggles which are still relevant for the relations between Africa and the former colonial powers, are condensed. 2019 marks 25 years of the first democratic election in this country. The fight against racist structures and the struggles for social equality have united many local, national and transnational movements. The Post-Apartheid experience of continuous extreme inequalities and the ongoing defence of democracy have created cutting edge analyses and vivid discourses in South Africa. Their understandings into colonial continuities and structural interconnections of racism and the global economy reach far beyond South Africa.

These insights are also relevant for the struggles in Europe against growing racism and rightwing nationalism. Because the search for new forms of social relations in the Post-Apartheid represent a model of the search for a postcolonial perspective, which urges to break colonial and racist structures and logics.

On this background, Afrika neu denken is focusing this year on postcolonial analyses and perspectives from South Africa which show the connections between European and African developments. At the same time they are searching for creative ways how to understand Post-Apartheidi as a global perspective to fight against structural racism and to position itself against new forms of rightwing nationalist networks, movements and politics.

These South African experiences and discourses are opening new perspectives and questions also to the Europe-Africa relations in Germany.
